IV. PRESENTATION(S)

Request by Mayor & Council members for discussion with possible action:

- (2904.1) A. Request from Mayor Aldo Tatangelo:
1. Presentation by Mr. Raymond Rodriguez, Merrill Lynch are representative, regarding Mercado contract.

Mr. Raymond Rodriguez, resident Vice-President of Merrill Lynch, briefed Council on Merrill Lynch's proposal. He further stated that they have contemplated opening an office in Laredo for sometime. They presently have an office in McAllen which has operated for the past 7-1/2 years with approximately 26 brokers and a capital of \$2.5 million. Merrill Lynch has given permission for a Laredo office which is the only office they have approved. Mr. Rodriguez further indicated that Merrill Lynch is a supporter of the arts and community endeavors and will be a major contributor. Mayor Pro-Tem Cortez asked

if they would consider another site. Mr. Rodriguez stated that he could not assure that Merrill Lynch would consider an alternate site, due to the process of going through the planning stages again. If the firm is established, 6 to 8 financial consultants plus 3 support staff will be employed with half being from the City of Laredo.

Mr. Hank Domeracki, Finance Director, stated that Merrill Lynch would have an option to cancel the lease after 5 years, with a 30 day notice.

Mr. Paul Perales, Laredo National Bank Executive, spoke in opposition of Merrill Lynch's proposal and recommended that the Chamber of Commerce or the Laredo Development Foundation be approached instead as possible tenants. Mr. Perales further stated that the Laredo Development Foundation is paying approximately \$1.50 a square foot for office space at their present location as well as improvements and electricity. Furthermore, Mr. Perales stated that Laredo National Bank is willing to provide unlimited parking to both entities if they relocate.

Mr. David Guerra, Bank of Commerce Executive, stated that the issue is not the lease itself but what will happen to the Mercado. Mr. Guerra is not in favor of having office space leases mixed with small business shops. He further supports the idea of forming a committee to give all concerned an opportunity to participate in the discussion.

Mr. Larry Norton, businessman, concurred with Mr. Guerra's comments, and stated that at the City Council Committee of the Whole meeting the discussion should not have involved rates but rather use of the project.

Mr. Lee Norton, committee member, informed that the committee was approached about 9 months ago by the previous administration to request assistance in recruiting tenants. He further stated that Merrill Lynch never made any offer or proposals to the City. Merrill Lynch requested information which was provided by Mr. Hank Domeracki and his staff. Mr. Norton also expressed concern with the fact that the committee was never informed that there were objections out in the community.

Councilman Ramirez stated that City Council was not aware 9 months ago that there was objection by a local bank representative regarding the Merrill Lynch lease.

- (1672.3) L. SECTION C SUB-SECTION I ON THE STREET PAVING AND ASSESSMENT POLICY BE AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:
1. 90% of the cost of improvements relating to the street abutting property including curb gutter, excavation, caliche base, lime stabilized base (as required), Asphalt oil, asphalt or concrete surface, drains, culverts and any appurtenances incidental to the improvements including 10% of engineering fees.

The 90% of the street improvements costs shall be apportioned between the properties abutting said improvements as set forth in Article 1105b, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes up to the maximum amounts set forth in Paragraph C, Subparagraphs 3 and 4.

The existing policy has distributed 1/3 of the cost

to each side, which has resulted in the maximum assessment, which applies to business and apartment uses and vacant property, being less than \$15 on some projects. This change will eliminate arguments over cost allocations and allow the \$15 per front foot rate to apply to all business, apartments or vacant properties.
