I. MAYOR TO CALL THE MEETING TO ORDER

Mayor Aldo Tatangelo called the meeting to order.

III. DISCUSSION OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT LIST.

City Manager Townsend distributed a report which provided a listing and general description of the capital improvement needs of the City. Its purpose is to assist the orderly planning & development and insure maximum use of financial resources. Those projects included were as follows:

STREETS

The paving program is financed principally by the 1986 General Obligation Bonds, Community Development Funds, as well as assessments levied against property owners. The level of the 1986 GOB expenses indicates funding is available only for engineering of 52 blocks, which were approved by City Council during January 1988. If paving of 200 blocks yearly is projected, for 5 years, a \$5.0 million dollar bond election is required.

WATER

A 24" main on Tilden, Guatemozine/Meadow and San Luis is needed from the existing 30" Line on Galveston to the Milmo pump station at an estimated cost exceeding \$1.3. The other major concern is construction of a ground storage facility and high service pump in North Laredo which also exceeds \$1.3.

SEWER

Two bond sales are needed to finance sewer construction needs. A \$2.0 sale in mid 1988 would expand the North Waste Water Treatment Plant (formerly Del Mar Plant) and con-

struct effluent line. Debt requirement would be addressed by available revenues.

OTHER CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS
Public Library expansion project is to begin shortly, and
is part of the 1986 GOBs.
The Lyon/Park/Zacate Creek Park should begin in 1989 and
is funded by Community Development funds.

City Hall Building, through a bond sale in 1988, is to be constructed in 1988.

Signalization, in great part, is financed by State Dept. of Highways. Three major projects to be addressed in 1988 include U.S.Hwy. 83, at its intersections with Loop 20, Napoleon, and Chestnut Streets.

The Lyon/Frost Drainage Project should begin in 1988 with Tapeyste Drainage Project in 1989. Both projects are part of the 1986 GOB's and total \$3,050,000.

In resume, the last 4 years of capital improvements have been financed by \$16.0 of GOBs, \$13.0 Certificates of Obligation supported by sewer revenues and paving assessments, and \$10.0 of federal assistance. The remaining balances are sufficient to address projects through 1989 and 1990. However, projections for the next five years will require an increase in taxes, water and sewer rates with impact of the latter to be presented at a later date.

City Manager Townsend explained Bond Sales, Capital Improvement Projects, and authorized projects with the following alternatives. If a rapid schedule is pursued to complete projects, a .02¢ tax increment, with all bonds sold at this time, would be definitely required. However, if projects were extended over a period of time, the tax increment would not be needed. With a rapid schedule pursued, projects would be terminated promptly. However, this would strain staff capacity and, in essence, the very expenditure pattern of the City would be part of the cause of economic slowdown as well as there would be a "gap", that is, there would be no projects or capital improvements to pursue. The possibility of a "middle" alternative would be another bond sale in early 1989. If this occurs, debt service reserves will be drawn the following year, that is, more debt service payments would be incurred with less revenues received. Consequently, if tax income level not raised and expenses level increases the City would not be in an advantageous position to sell bonds or have another election. However, it remains a viable option.

A list of projections was distributed to Councilmembers with Mr. Townsend pointing out several projects for which financing was not available.

The Mayor and Councilmembers, major concern centered on a probable tax increment, timeliness of projects, as well as water system needs and drainage issues with further dis-

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cussion of the latter to occur at the next regular City Council Meeting.
