Budget Workshop continuation.

Keith Selman, City Planner, made the Capital Improvement Programs presentation before the Council. He reported the following:

Since 1985, the City's first bond program in over 30 years, the City has continued an aggressive capital improvements program to meet the demands of the fastest growing City in the State. Below are the bond sales of tax-supported debt which have been sold since 1985 and are supported by a current tax rate of approximately 20 cents..

The three primary methods of financing capital improvements for the City has been long-term debt, bridge revenues transferred to Capital Improvements Fund, and Community Development Block Grant Funds. The following represents a brief description of the proposal for long-term debt, bridge revenues, and Community Development Block Grant Funds.

Long-Term Debt

Enclosed as Exhibit 1 is a review of the tax rate between 1985 and 1998. In 1998, a bond issue of \$16,160,000 in certificates of obligation were sold (Exhibit 2). This sale was made possible as a result of outstanding bond retirement and was accomplished without a tax rate increase.

An increase in 1997 of wastewater fees presented an opportunity to incur additional debt service to meet the growing wastewater needs. In FY 1999 a bond issue of \$6,415,000 in certificates of obligation were sold. In order to meet increased needs in our water delivery system, we are proposing a certificate of obligation issue of approximately \$3,850,000 to be paid for under the current fee structure.

For the construction of International Bridge IV, \$29,400,000 has been borrowed through the State Infrastructure Bank and \$30,260,000 in bonds have been sold. An additional \$9,000,000 in bonds are proposed for the installation of Weigh in Motion systems at the four international crossings.

The downtown area continues to have limited parking despite the construction of the Transit Center Parking Garage. A \$1,050,000 certificate of obligation is proposed to help meet these needs. The bond will be supported by revenue generated by the current parking rate structure.

COMPENSATION PLAN

The Proposed plan consists of a three year implementation period. The plan consists of the following:

COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENT (COLA)

The proposed COLA for each year is necessary to keep up with inflation. (Note: Slavin and Nevans had proposed COLA to be granted yearly in order to maintain the plan competitive with the market.)

- + The last pay plan adjustment was given on 10-1-98 consisting of 2.5%. This adjustment included 1.9 National Consumer Price Index (CPI).
- + The proposed COLA for year one (FY 99-00) is 2.0%. This percentage was calculated by adjusting the National Consumer Price Index (CPI) of 1.6 by 25% (City of Laredo inflation factor).

Source: Consumer Price Index

MERIT INCREASE BASED ON MEASURABLE PERFORMANCE FACTORS

A new method of calculating the merit increases based on measurable performance factors is proposed. This method will consist of the following tiers:

+ Tier I:

If employee gets a 3.0 on their performance evaluation, the employee will advance to Tier II.

+ Tier II:

This tier will consist of Measurable Performance Factor Adjustments

that will enable the employee to possibly receive up to 5% merit increase depending on their activities, work load, attendance, training & education, and safety records during the 12 month evaluation period.

Measurable Performance Factor Adjustment

Leadership Development Progress or Other comparable professional program (selected during 12 months).

Cost Savings and Significant Program Innovations Department Recommended City Manager approval.

High Performance Evaluation Score (4.0).

Extra Work: Projects or Committees

Projects or Committees outside of normal work assignments.

Excellent Attendance Record

Not more than 4 Sick Leave days/yr.

Not more than 5 tardies/yr.

Training and Education

(3) Three training certifiable events or Educational Milestone (G.E.D., AA, BS or BA, MMS, Phd) or professional certification during 12 month prior to evaluation.

Excellent Safety Record

Labor intense employees only (no infractions) High Risk employees (no infractions)

Sick Leave Buyback

Year 1 & 2

Non civil service employees who have accumulated 60 days of Sick Leave prior to October 1 of that year may sell to the City 2 days of unused sick leave in exchange of one paid day up to 3 paid days (50%) or sell at a rate of 1 day of unused sick leave in exchange for 1 paid day up to 6 paid days if placed in a deferred compensation plan (100%).

Year 3

The amount of days that could be purchased by the City will double, in each prospective category.

Longevity Pay

Employees that have been with the City 5 years will be entitled to longevity pay. Longevity pay will begin on their 5th year anniversary (consecutive service months) and will be calculated as follows:

\$5.00 per each month of service per year. Payment will be

paid bi-weekly.

Example: $$5.00 \times 12 (1 \text{ year}) = 60.00 per year.

At year 5, employee will be receiving \$300.00 adjustment. At year 6, employee will be receiving \$360.00, etc.

Annual Leave Accumulation Cap

The proposed includes to raise the annual leave accumulation cap to 720 hours as opposed to the current 480 hours cap that are allowed.

This would become an incentive for our long term employees and retirees.

The difference between the committee's plan and the City Manager's proposal is the following:

Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA)

The proposed COLA for FY 99-00 is 1.6% .

Merit Increase based on Measurable Performance Factors

A new method of calculating the merit increases based on measurable performance factors is proposed. This method will consist of the following tiers:

Tier I:

- + If employee earns a 3.0 to 3.49 on their performance evaluation, the employee will receive a 1% pay increase and will be eligible for Tier II.
- + If employee earns a 3.50 to 4.49 on their performance evaluation, the employee will receive a 2% pay increase and will be eligible for Tier II.
- + If employee earns a 4.50 and above on their performance evaluation, the employee will receive a 3% pay increase and will be eligible for Tier II.

Tier II:

+ This tier will consist of Measurable Performance Factor Adjustments that will enable the employee to possibly receive points that can increase their merit increase up to 5% depending on their activities, work load, attendance, training and education, and safety records during the 12 month evaluation period.

Sick Leave Buyback

FY 1999-2000

Non civil service employees who have accumulated 60 days of Sick Leave Prior to October 1 of that year may sell to the City 2 days of unused sick leave in exchange of one paid day up to 3 paid days (50%) or: sell at a rate of 1 day of unused sick leave in exchange for 1 paid day up to 6 paid days if placed in a deferred compensation plan (100%).

Retirement Incentive Proposal

Non-civil service employees with a combination of service years and age equal to or greater than 80. (66 employees).

Retire between October 1, 1999 and March 31, 2000.

City pays contribution for Retiree Medical Insurance for 5 years

(Option II, III or IV*). City pays all sick leave accrual without applying 720 hour limit. City pays all annual leave accrual without applying 420 hour limit.
